## A LONG, LONG TIME AGO...

Several hundred years ago, Lochend, Restalrig and Craigentinny were part of one of the huge baronial estates that used to surround Edinburgh. Although distant from Edinburgh's Old Town, for hundreds of years it saw processions of pilgrims visit St Triduana's Healing Spring, while the 16th-18th centuries brought tales of witchcraft, marauding armies and deadly plagues. In 1784 locals witnessed the first hot-air balloon flight in Britain, as James Tytler crash-landed near Restalrig. A few years later, Captain Macrae of Marionville House had to flee the country after a deadly duel.



### TODAY...

In the 21st century, the factories and mills are demolished or redeveloped as housing, and the area is now a largely residential suburb. The railway lines are no longer open to trains, and now support walkers, dogs, bicycles and wildlife. The communities have also changed; new generations have been born, families have moved away, while others have arrived from near and far. Many will be unaware of the history and heritage in Lochend, Restalrig and Craigentinny. It is hoped that this leaflet will help you explore the neighbourhood, connect with the community and enjoy a greater sense of belonging.



### **NOT SO LONG AGO...**

Steam trains arrived in the 1830s, and from the 1870s the city, for so long just the Old and New Towns, began to expand outwards. New industries such as tallow works, roperies and woollen mills began, adding their noises and smells to those of Hawkhill Quarry, Lochend Farm and the Craigentinny Meadows, irrigated with sewage! In the 1930s the farmland began to disappear as council housing and bungalows were built, along with schools, churches, and recreational facilities such as sports grounds and Craigentinny Golf Course. By the 1950s the fields had gone, delivery horses were being replaced by vans, and trains were getting diesel engines.

Now a haven for waterbirds, Lochend Loch in Lochend Park once supplied Leith with fresh water and has been used over the centuries for hunting, fishing, boating and even ice-skating!



Park is over 400 years old. Local kids nick-named it 'Wullie's Pail' for comic strip legend Oor Wullie.



Originally the 'big house' of The Logans of Restalrig, by the later 20th century **Lochend House** was home to many social services support groups.



Built in 1920s, on the site of Lochend Farm, Lochend Housing Estate was one of Edinburgh's first council housing schemes.

Local industries once included rope-works, print-works, sawmills, and brewery maltings. The railway line that served them has become quiet, leafy Restalrig Bike Path connecting to Seafield and Leith.



Marionville House was built in the 1780s for the Ramsay Sisters, successful Edinburgh business women. In the 20th century, as the Presbytery for St Ninian's and St Triduana's Roman Catholic Church, it provided a vital social space, hosting family events and youth clubs.



The site of a popular family shop, from 1908-1982, **Kemp's Comer** is named after original owner, Charles Kemp.

Red-brick 1890s

Munrospun Factory
(formerly Kinloch
Anderson) employed
local women producing
fine woollen goods for
almost 100 years. Now
residential flats, its tall
water-tower still dominates
the skyline.





Football Club, founded by Irish immigrants in 1875, Easter Road Stadium has echoed to its fans' chants and cheers since 1893!



Hawkhill is where King James III (1451-1488) once hunted with his hawks. In 1769 it was the site of one of Edinburgh's earliest observatories in the grounds of Hawkhill House, noted justice Lord Alemoor's country villa.

The russet-topped tower-blocks of Nisbet Court and Hawkhill Court recall the tall, red brick

chimney of an earlier factory that produced tallow, a key ingredient of soap and candles.

12 Bethlehem translates to 'house of bread' in Hebrew. Bethlehem Way commemorates the Smith's and Sunblest Bakeries that once stood here.



The large villa of Restalrig House was replaced by the tower-blocks of **Restalrig House And Lochend House** in the 1960s-70s.



One of Scotland's most ancient saints, **St Triduana** is said to have died in Restalrig where her healing spring for eye complaints can still be found. This was a highly significant medieval pilgrimage site.

15 Once known as 'the hut' and used as Boy Scouts' clubhouse, the Lochend Boxing Club (est 2007) trained Commonwealth Games medal-winner Josh 'The Tartan Tornado' Taylor.



Originally built around 1604, **Craigentinny Castle** (or House), was remodelled in 1849 and saved from demolition in the 1930s by Edinburgh Council. Opening in 1937 as Scotland's first Community Centre, it continues this important role today.



The area is home to many greenspaces. The largest and oldest is Lochend Park. **Craigentinny Community Garden** is one of the smallest and newest. Together with the Lochend Secret Garden, a more established community garden, and the Restalrig & Craigentinny Allotments, these much-loved green spaces were especially important during the 2020 Covid lockdowns.



The Hub replaced the old YWCA 'hut' that once stood here, both vital local resources. Older residents recall "Y Dub" discos, youth clubs and baby-groups. Now The Ripple Project welcomes all to its friendly community café, activities, services and support groups.

22 Now a Conservation Area, the ancient Village Of Restalrig was first recorded in the 12th century and remained surrounded by farmland until the 1930s.



Built of prefabricated steel for easy construction in the 1920s, the Findlay Estate Houses were part of a post-war national building programme.



the mausoleum and resting place of William H. Miller (1789-1848).
Many of the area's streets are named for members of the Miller family, owners of the Craigentinny Estate.

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Beside St Triduana's Chapel, St Margaret's Parish Church was once an important medieval Catholic Church with Royal patronage. Rebuilt in the 1830s as a Church of Scotland, today the church and nearby McLaren Halls form a welcoming social and spiritual hub for the community.
